PASTOR'S PONDERINGS



THE POWER IN STORY....!

When I was a child I remember vividly being read stories from Uncle Arthur's Bedtime Stories. It was a huge book – well I thought it was huge at that age – with a blue cover and the picture of Uncle Arthur on the front. Some of you may remember that same book? Does anyone still have a copy? I'd love to get one for the record! Fast forward several years - I'm living in South Kolan (just north of Bundaberg) and through Mum and Dad, I met this 'old' guy with a wooden leg who befriended us all and taught all of us so much about the country and how to appreciate it. I recall sitting around his kitchen table or around the fire on his property and he would tell us stories. The ones I remember the most are his personal ones. How he used his wooden leg to kill a snake (he reckons it was a taipan) as it was slithering up the guest bed leg with a guest in it! He used to say, "Stories are good for the soul and people will always listen to your stories if they're true." It seems to me that in addition, when we tell our own story it cements it in our own mind and becomes easier and often more real when we re-tell it. Peter, of biblical times, was a Jew and as such was forbidden, amongst a plethora of other things, to eat anything that was deemed unclean. He was in Joppa, a Jewish town, and was hungry. It was lunch time. But before he eats, he has a vision in which a tablecloth descends from heaven (Acts 10: 9-16). God asks him to eat but his laws won't allow him. Then God reminds Peter that what God says is clean is clean. Peter eventually realizes that the meaning of that dream concerned God's love for all people - not just the Jews but the Gentiles. Just as God can make Jews worthy recipients of His grace and mercy so He can for all people. Peter then in Chapter 11 finds himself telling the story. As readers now we at times find this frustrating. We've just read about the vison now we're reading it again. But for Peter this was huge. It was a turning point for him and his future story telling. What about us? What stories do we tell? Can we tell and re-tell the story of connection with Jesus and the difference He has made for us? There is power in your story of salvation. Let's be a people who love to tell our story! It just might be amazing to see what God will do! Shalom - Dave
